

Tree Warden Report 2022

Trees are rapidly moving up the priority list.

The need to cope with CO2 in the atmosphere is becoming more and more urgent. To this end, Tree Wardens across Suffolk are planting more and more, “right trees in the right places” than we have ever done before.

In Autumn just gone, we planted 24,000 mixed species in Suffolk. In our Redgrave area we have planted more than 1,000 trees plus many metres of new hedging.

Across Suffolk the Tree Warden Network” have planted 30,000 tree seeds for next years planting season, where we have established a number of Tree Nurseries, right across the County.

With the recent storms, we have lost quite a few trees locally, so it’s become even more important that Suffolk increases its tree cover, especially as this is the Queens 70th jubilee, and Her Majesty specifically asked that trees be planted to celebrate the occasion.

Concerned people within Redgrave have come together and have agreed to form a group of like minded volunteers. The group is called “Green Redgrave” and have plans to make our village into a Wildlife friendly area, anyone wishing to join would be most welcome.

They have started, and plan to plant Broadleaf and Fruit trees on the Old School Playing Field.

They meet in the” Cross Keys”at 7.00pm on the first Tuesday of the month, no special skills required just come along.
